As we look back on the 2024–2025 fiscal year, we are grateful for your support and proud of all we've accomplished together. Thanks to you, Patten Free Library continues to be more than just a library—we are a place where curiosity is sparked, connections are made, and our community thrives.







Starting in September 2024 the Library began construction to replace the aging roof, install heat pumps, and place 55 solar panels on the new roof. The air conditioning turned on over the summer, much to the delight of patrons and staff.



#### CHILDREN'S DEPARTMENT

A new family moved to Bath with four kids, all looking for something to do. Their first stop was our local library, where each child got a library card and pamphlets filled with upcoming programs. One child was especially excited about Minecraft Monday, proudly announcing he would "bring a whole Xbox to play." We all laughed—but he meant it. Sure enough, a week later, the family returned, the eldest lugging a full gaming system. After receiving praise from the librarians for his dedication, they headed upstairs, and the club went off without a hitch. Afterward, the volunteer who runs the club came down to say the kids were thrilled by the setup, and they had even figured out how to stream the game on our AV system so everyone could watch.

The whole family was delighted and has returned many times for all kinds of programs. We're lucky to have such enthusiastic patrons and proud to offer a space where kids can share their interests and joy with others.



#### **TEEN SPACE**

One of our hopes for the teen space is to empower teens to take the lead in planning and running their own programs, and we were lucky to see that vision come to life when Kai Chretien approached us with an idea for a Minecraft club. While the library already offers a Minecraft program for younger kids, Kai wanted to create a space for slightly older players, specifically ages 8–12—an age group that often falls between the children's room and the teen space. It was a perfect opportunity to support a teen-led program while also serving a group that doesn't always have targeted offerings.

Kai handled nearly everything himself: he chose the dates and times, set a clear goal, created a dedicated email account for communication, and even designed and posted his own flyers around town. With a mix of in-person and digital participation, the group met in the teen space every other week for six sessions. We're so proud of what Kai accomplished and hope to see the program return in the fall.

#### **PROGRAMMING**

At our first Repair Café in November 2022, Juniper brought in a broken handheld gaming device. Volunteers offered guidance, and though it couldn't be fixed that day, she left with next steps—and a spark of inspiration. Over two years, Juniper turned the project into a homeschool engineering challenge, returning often for help from volunteer mentor Oscar. Today, her mom Amy volunteers too, mending knitted items and giving back to the community that supported them. For both, the Repair Café has become more than a place to fix things—it's a place to grow.

#### **HISTORY ROOM**

One of the primary focuses for the History Room over the past year has been revisiting the ways in which the archive engages with its community partners and contributes to the library's mission. In September of 2024, the History Room partnered with the Brightfield School for a two week long unit teaching students about genealogical and historical research and how to utilize primary and secondary sources. The occurrence of the 21st annual Town History Series also precipitated discussions around how best to update the event to meet the contemporary needs and interests of the service area communities while preserving the essence of the lecture series which has become a pillar in PFL's programming schedule.

The value of a volunteer hour was \$34.79 in 2024. That's a value of \$212,602 for PFL.


